# **Guide to Non-Immigrant Visas**

#### **Temporary Stay in the United States**

## What is a Non-Immigrant Visa?

Non-immigrant visas allow foreign nationals to temporarily enter the U.S. for a specific purpose such as tourism, education, business, or employment. Once the purpose is completed, the individual must return to their home country.

### **Common Types of Non-Immigrant Visas**

- **B-1/B-2 Visa:** For business visitors (B-1) or tourists and medical patients (B-2).
- F-1 Visa: For students enrolled in academic institutions.
- H-1B Visa: For professionals in specialty occupations requiring at least a bachelor's degree.
- **L-1 Visa:** For intracompany transferees, allowing multinational companies to transfer managers, executives, or specialized knowledge employees.
- **E-1/E-2 Visa:** For traders and investors from countries with which the U.S. has treaties of commerce and navigation.
- **J-1 Visa:** For participants in exchange visitor programs, including trainees, scholars, and researchers.
- O-1 Visa: For individuals with extraordinary ability in science, arts, education, business, or athletics.
- TN Visa: For Canadian and Mexican professionals under USMCA (formerly NAFTA).

#### **Application Process**

- 1. Select the appropriate visa category based on your purpose of travel
- 2. Complete DS-160 Online Nonimmigrant Visa Application
- 3. Pay visa fee and schedule an interview at a U.S. embassy or consulate
- 4. Attend visa interview and provide required documents

5. Receive visa stamp and prepare for entry to the U.S.

## **Work Authorization & Restrictions**

Some non-immigrant visas allow employment (e.g., H-1B, L-1), while others strictly prohibit it (e.g., B-1/B-2, F-1 without OPT). Always verify with legal counsel whether your visa permits work authorization.

### **Maintaining Visa Status**

To remain in compliance:

- Do not overstay your visa expiration date
- Follow all conditions of your visa type
- Report any changes in employment, address, or program participation
